REPORT CARD FOR 2016-2017

- * Learning Through The Arts (ALTTA) workshops and residencies reached 5300 students and 221 teachers in 11 elementary and intermediate schools in Garland, Pope and Saline Counties.
- * Eight new programs were added and one new Teaching Artist joined the Artist Roster.
- * Contributors this fiscal year included eight foundations, two government entities, two endowments, two businesses, one service club and 110 individuals. ALTTA moved up to 10th place in the small nonprofit category of Arkansas Gives.



HOW THE ARTS IMPROVES ACHIEVEMENT IN LITERACY

"The arts can encourage and motivate kids in all aspects of their school lives, including teaching academic skills.

- * When kids act out a story, discuss a painting, or perform a play, they improve their reading and writing skills.
- * Noticing musical patterns and rhythms can help them with math because they're organizing information quantitatively.

The arts not only give kids a creative, expressive break in their school day, but also provide a multi-sensory approach to learning, incorporating three major learning styles: visual, auditory, and physical. Most people learn best through one of these three different styles."

ALTTA WORKSHOP RESULTS

- * Artists capture students' attention through their art and they become interested in learning.
- * Student imagination is sparked, leading to active participation.
- * Opportunities for sharing opinions orally and in writing are fostered via arts-integrated learning.
- * Students are motivated to do additional reading and research.
- * Interest in and attendance at school increases.
- * Teachers are inspired to further engage students through the arts.

FACTS AND FIGURES FOR ARKANSAS and GARLAND COUNTY

- * On average, Arkansas students score the lowest on the state writing assessment compared to other subjects.
- * 'Met Proficiency' level for students tested in grades 3 – 10 Reading 38.9% of students Writing 30.7% of students
- * In only four (of ten) elementary schools in Garland County do the 3rd and 4th graders score better than the state average.
- * For 3rd grade, one school scoring "Needs Improvement" two years ago has the highest score for the county.
 - ALTTA has been working in that school for four years.
- * ALTTA has worked with four of the five schools that now have the top 4th grade writing scores.

HOW THE ORGANIZATION HAS GROWN

In 2012, Arkansas Learning Through The Arts (ALTTA) was initiated with the vision of improving learning through using the arts as a mechanism for inspiring students. The workshops and programs were patterned after Big Thought, a successful and award-winning program in the Dallas area school systems. The "big thought" is, inspiring *imagina*tion in everyday learning.

A small group of volunteers developed an organization, raised funds, consulted school administrators and teachers and recruited professional teaching artists. A professional arts educator with experience in the Dallas area schools and with Big Thought was recruited to assure the quality of the programs.

Initially serving one school in Garland County, Arkansas Learning Through The Arts now serves over 5,000 students with over 580 workshops in three counties and ten school districts. As you can see from the comments by teachers on the first page, the reception has been very positive and administrators have been quick to schedule programs year after year to assure their schools have ALTTA programs that align with their curriculum.
